Lambda Pi Eta inductees must have completed 60 semester hours in undergraduate credit courses, have a cumulative grade point average of at least 3.0; have completed the equivalent of 12 semester hours in courses in communication; have a grade point average of at least 3.25 in these courses; be in the upper 35% of their graduating class; and be currently enrolled as a full-time student in good standing with their institution.

Now celebrating its 20th anniversary this year as the Upsilon chapter at Kent State, Lambda Pi Eta stimulates interest in the field of communication, promotes and encourages professional development among communication majors, provides an opportunity to discuss and exchange ideas in the field of communication, establishes and maintains closer relationships between faculty and students, and assists students in exploring options for graduate education in communication studies.

KCS, CGSA, and the School of Communication Studies team up for Relay for Life

The School of Communication Studies, along with the Kent Communication Society (KCS) and the Communication Graduate Student Association (CGSA), is teaming up for Kent State University's Relay for Life event. All communication studies students, faculty, and staff will participate in this philanthropy event.

Relay for Life begins Saturday, April 21, at 10 a.m. at the Liquid Crystal Small Group Track and ends 10 a.m. Sunday, April 22.

Relay for Life helps build awareness for cancer research. Last year Kent State raised over \$86,000. Relay for Life is 24-hour event during which team members take turns walking around the track. Food, games, and activities provide entertainment and fundraising opportunities. Events include the survivors lap, the luminaria ceremony, and the fight back ceremony.

To raise funds KCS members have been selling hot chocolate, doughnuts, and snacks in Taylor Hall. Along with the doughnut sale, KCS members have been visiting classes to promote the sale of special KCS Relay for Life t-shirts and hoodies. To date KCS has raised \$1,045. With everyone's support across the school – students, faculty and staff – the school hopes to take first place in this year's Relay for Life, according to Kyle Buttermore, KCS President.
