The United Nations current definition, written in 1948, stands as follows:

Genocide means any of the following acts committed with intent to destroy, in whole or in part, a national, ethnical, racial or religious group, as such:

- a) Killing members of the group;
- b) Causing serious bodily or mental harm to members of the group;
- Deliberately inflicting on the group conditions of life calculated to bring about its physical destruction in whole or in part;
- d) Imposing measures intended to prevent births within the group;
- e) Forcibly transferring children of the group to another group

To prevent genocide, the U.N. takes steps to:

- ✓ Prevent armed conflict
- ✓ Protect civilians in armed conflict
- ✓ End impunity through judicial action
- ✓ Gather information & set up early warning system
- ✓ Take swift & decisive action

With a necessary 5/5 vote, to date, the U.N. has successfully prevented <u>0</u> genocides & has only a slightly better record of stopping them.

ABOUT GENOCIDE

Why?

Genocide is employed in order to:

- eliminate a real or potential threat
- spread terror among real or potential enemies
- acquire economic wealth
- implement a belief or ideology

Where?

The false assumption is that this occurs only in developing countries, but genocide can take place anywhere.

When?

Genocide can arise at any time but does not occur spontaneously; it takes planning & organization.

How?

Plans of destruction are developed & set into action. Warning signs include: heightened tension between groups sudden changes in power symbolism/identification isolation of a group dehumanization of a group

Who?

Victims: Those targeted & exterminated

Perpetrators: Those who carry out plans & commit crimes against the victims

Bystanders: Those who are present but refrain from involvement

Rescuers: Those who aid & save victims

Where?

Darfur: the western region of Sudan, Africa

When?

2003-Present

Who?

Sudanese President Omar al-Bashir & his allied militia, the Janjaweed, are targeting non-Arab villagers

Why?

Two rebel groups mounted an insurgency against Sudan's central govt. in 2003. In response, non-Arab civilians (of similar background) have been targeted in pursuit to create a union of Arab states.

Destruction:

Over 2 million people have been displaced. Villages are destroyed, & people are murdered, enslaved, & raped. Livestock are stolen, food stocks burned, & water sources contaminated by the dead

Death Toll:

300,000 have died as of 2008. It is estimated that the death rate is 5,000/mo.

What has been done?

2004: Recognized genocide 2008: U.N. sends 26,000 troops

2009-2011: Arrest warrant is issued for Omar al-Bashir for crimes against humanity & genocide

China & Russia have blocked many U.N. resolutions due to political & economic investments
